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MYP AT DOBBS FERRY HIGH SCHOOL

Dobbs Ferry High School became an authorized Middle Years Programme school in December, 2016. The school is an authorized International Baccalaureate World School in partnership with Dobbs Ferry Middle School. The MYP runs from grades 6-10.

Dobbs Ferry High School offers MYP as an inclusive, whole-school model. We believe that all students are capable of achieving at high levels when they are both challenged and nurtured. The MYP provides a healthy balance of academic enrichment and support that enables students to perform to their full potential.

Students in grade 10 will complete a Personal Project, according to MYP guidelines, as a culminating experience of their work in grades 6-10. The Personal Project is an indepth inquiry project where students focus their research on an area of their interest. Students receive credit for completing the Personal Project.

The Middle Years Programme (MYP) is one of three programmes offered by the International Baccalaureate Organization (IBO). It has been designed for students from Grade 6 through Grade 10. MYP meets students where they are academically, socially, and emotionally, and seeks to provide them with the knowledge, attitudes, and skills they need in order to make positive contributions in the rapidly changing world. In the Dobbs Ferry School District, all students participate in the MYP from grades 6-10.

MYP is a flexible instructional framework that encourages students to become critical thinkers, lifelong learners, and responsible global citizens. Students are provided with opportunities to learn actively, express their ideas in a variety of ways, apply knowledge in real situations, and reflect on the learning process.

Global Contexts

The teaching and learning in the MYP includes global contexts that provide relevance and meaning, which promotes student engagement, discourse, international-mindedness, and global engagement.

Approaches to Learning (ATL Skills)

Through approaches to learning in MYP, students develop skills that have relevance across the curriculum that help them "learn how to learn". These skills also prepare them for the 21st century workforce. Approaches to learning skills are taught, improved with practice, and developed gradually throughout the MYP. They provide a solid foundation for both learning independently as well as with others. ATL skills help students prepare for and demonstrate learning through meaningful assessment. They provide a common language that students and teachers can use to reflect on and articulate the process of learning. ATL skills are categorized into five different groups: Communication; Research; Self-Management; Social and Thinking.
