In case you want to make the soup...

<u>Ingredients:</u>

- 10 oz. portabella mushrooms, chopped
- 2 yellow onions, peeled and chopped
- 4 carrots, peeled and chopped
- 2 celery stalks, chopped
- 1/2 cup olive oil
- 2 bunches Swiss chard, tough stems removed. Leaves chopped
 - 6 potatoes, peeled and chopped
 - 2 cups corn, sliced from cob
- 3 cups butternut squash, peeled, seeded and diced
- 1 28 oz. can plum tomatoes or fresh tomatoes, chopped
- 4 cups of cooked beans (use kidney or black beans) Soak and drain
 - 16 cups vegetable broth
 - 1 Parmigiana-Reggiano rind
 - 1/2 lb. pasta, Ditalini or any desired

shape

- Salt and pepper to taste
- Grated Parmigiano-Reggiano cheese for garnish
 - Fresh parsley for garnish

Heat oil in a large stock pot.

Add onions, carrots, and celery. Saute 10 minutes until soft.

Add mushrooms, Swiss chard, potatoes, corn, butternut squash, tomatoes, beans and cheese rind.

Add enough vegetable broth to cover vegetables.

Bring to a boil.

Cover and simmer for 2-3 hours. Add more broth or water as needed.

Add salt and pepper to taste.

Add cooked pasta. Cook for 10 more minutes.

Serve with grated cheese and parsley as garnish, if desired.





These are KenKens, and KenKen rules are very direct. Fill in each square cell in the puzzle with a number between 1 and the size of the grid. For example, in a 3×3 grid, use the numbers 1, 2, & 3. Another example is in a 4×4 grid, use the numbers 1, 2, 3, & 4. The goal of a KenKen puzzle is to fill in the whole grid with numbers, making sure no numbers are repeated in any row or column. When you see the puzzle, the numbers are what you want to get to and the +, -, and x are how you

want to solve the equation. The rules are simple once you've played a few times, but the most important rule is to have fun while solving the puzzle! Below are some KenKens to try.


We interviewed Mr. Rosen about KenKen puzzles, and here is what he had to say:


1) What is the hardest thing about KenKen?

One of the great things about KenKen is that the beginning puzzles (3x3 addition) allow almost anyone to start. I have taught KenKen to 1st graders!

As the puzzles get larger, they get more difficult, so you can choose how difficult you want them to be. I think it is hard to consider that a cage may have a lot of different options, and to be patient to wait until you know for sure before putting the numbers in. This is why the candidates are so important. So the hardest thing is working

patiently and being sure to know a number before putting it in the cage.

2) What is the hardest KenKen to solve?

Believe it or not, in my opinion the most difficult KenKen is the 9x9 addition only. Why not the one with all of the operations, you may ask? Actually, multiplication and division have fewer possibilities than addition. For example (in a 9x9), if a cage is a 10x, the only option is 5x2. If a cage is a 4/ (divided), the only options are 8/2 and 4/1. However if a cage is a 10+, the options are 9+1. 8+2, 7+3, 6+4. If there is an L shaped cage with 10+ and three numbers, we have 8+1+1, 7+2+1, 6+2+2, 6+3+1, 5+4+1, 5+3+2, 4+3+3, 4+4+2, (8 options!!!!) What makes a KenKen challenging is not the size of the numbers in the cage, or even the operations involved, but the number of possible combinations there are that can make the target number. It is a challenge to narrow all of that down.

POLLUTION IN THE HUDSON RIVER

Have you ever gone on a walk at the waterfront park near the Hudson River? Or maybe you've played on the playground or had soccer practice there,or maybe you might have gone there for a birthday party. But whenever you've gone someplace near the Hudson River, have you ever noticed litter in the water or on the shore?

Although the Hudson River isn't nearly as dirty as the Ohio River, which happens to be one of the most polluted rivers in the U.S., it is still the most polluted river in New York.

What do you usually think of when you hear people talk about litter or more generally, pollution? One thought that might fly into your mind is giant landfills with millions of tons of trash. While landfills are polluting the world horribly,

things that you might see every day have an effect on litter in rivers and oceans too. Even just one bag of chips dropped on the ground can have an effect.

People are always talking about how trash adversely affects the environment, and how we shouldn't litter. But have you ever wondered why? What could one plastic bottle fallen on the ground do? How could one Snickers wrapper make its way into the ocean?

Think about it. When there are storms, the toxic chemicals and materials from the litter get washed and blown down into streams and rivers, and then carried by

the flowing water into oceans. In fact, seven billion tons of debris enters the world's oceans annually! That doesn't mean that all of the toxic chemicals are getting washed straight into the Atlantic Ocean; the waterways that carry trash and chemicals there get a great deal of the pollution as well. The Hudson River is a very good example of one of those waterways.

Although the amount of pollution in the Hudson River has decreased enough to go fishing, and swim in, the river is still very polluted, you can still find washed up plastic bottles and even torn up shoes along the edges of the river!

In addition, many aquatic animals in the Hudson River are dealing with PCBs (Polychlorinated Biphenyls). PCBs are highly carcinogenic chemical compounds that were used in the past in industrial and

consumer products. PCBs are poisonous to most animals exposed to it in almost any way, and were luckily banned from being used in products in the United States by the Toxic Substances Control act in 1979.

The next time you take a walk at the waterfront, play on the playground, or have soccer practice near the Hudson River, if you happen to stumble across litter, make sure to pick it up. It's always best to do what has the best effect on yourself and others, even if you don't feel like it. That includes picking up trash.



Inside Out and Back Again is the story of Kim Hà, A ten-year-old girl who lives in Sài Gòn during the American & Việt Nam War. Hà eventually escapes the war in Việt Nam.

Inside Out & Back Again is written in the form of poetry. The book begins and ends at Tết, the Tiếng Việt celebration of New Year.

The book is split into four parts. The first is *Saigon*; this part is about Hà's life in Sài Gòn during the war. It starts out with Hà telling us about Tết. The year is 1970, so it is the year of the Cat. In this part, Hà writes in her journal one poem that explains what life is like in just four stanzas:

Early Monsoon

We pretend The monsoon Has come early.

In the distance Bombs Explode like thunder, Slashes Lighten the sky, Gunfire falls like rain.

Distant Yet within ears, Within eyes.

Not that far away at all.


Hà also writes several poems about this topic, but this one is considered the most powerful. In addition to writing about the war, Hà writes about other things, like going to the market, her identity, her family and her missing father, and her favorite fruit: đu đủ. Đu đủ is the Vietnamese word for papaya. Hà writes a few poems about her favorite fruit and mentions offering the first fruit on her tree to her mother.

The second part, *At Sea*, is about Hà's experience on the boat when she escapes Việt Nam. She explains how hard it was on a ship with limited food and water. In one of her poems, Hà says that land is something that she once knew, which describes how long and difficult the journey was.

The third part of the story is named *Alabama*. This section of the story describes Hà's life in her new home. In this part of Hà's life, she must start a new school and fend off bullies, especially Pink Boy. In addition, Hà, her mother, and her three brothers learn to adjust to American culture in Alabama. Hà gets tutored by their neighbor, a widow who lives with her dog Lassie. The widow's name is Mrs. Washington, but Hà writes her name as MiSSSisss WaSShington. Hà does this with a lot of the characters' names, such as her teacher and her friends.

The fourth and final section of the book is titled *From Now On*. This part of the story is telling the reader about what her life is like after she has adjusted. Hà writes about Christmas, and hearing news about her missing father. The book ends in Têt again and this time, it is the year of the Dragon.

The author, Thanhha Lai, based the book on her experience during the American/Việt Nam War. Lai described Hà as 'a spunkier version of herself.' This book has received several awards: The Newberry Honor award and The National Book Award. If you have not read Inside Out & Back Again, you might be able to find it in the library.

Personally, we like Elf and Home Alone. Phoebe J. in fifth grade had this to say about her favorite holiday





FOUR INGREDIENT COOKIES

We all like cookies, so these four ingredient cookies are perfect if you don't have a lot of time. These cookies are delicious. If you are allergic to gluten, dairy, or sugar please don't eat them.

Ingredients

1 cup unsalted butter, about room temperature Sugar 2/3 cup and 3 tablespoons sugar, divided

2 cups and 1 tablespoon all-purpose flour , spooned and leveled

1 teaspoon vanilla

rainbow sprinkles (optional, but recommended)

chocolate chips (optional and if doing don't use the extra 2/3 cup of sugar)



Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 325 degrees F. Line 2 large baking sheets with parchment paper.
- 2. In a bowl, using an electric mixer, beat together butter and 2/3 cup sugar until combined.
- 3. Add in the flour and blend well then add vanilla
 - 4. Roll the dough into small-ish balls.
- 5. Gently roll the balls in the remaining 3 tablespoons of sugar until lightly coated. (Don't do this step if doing chocolate chips!)
 - 6. Transfer to the baking sheets 2 inches apart
- 7. With the bottom of a measuring cup press down on the balls to flatten. Sprinkle with some rainbow sprinkles if you are using them.
- 8. Bake for 14-16 minutes.
- 9. Remove form the oven and let rest on the baking sheets for at least 10-15 minutes. Enjoy!


