Bug Scouts: Out in the Wild!



by Lisa Wheeler & Loren Long





Eyes That Speak to the Stars






Kondo and Kezumi Visit Giant Island

Follow one day in the real lives of seven kids from around the world—Italy, Japan, Iran, India, Peru, Uganda, and Russia!




Harold & Hog Pretend for Real!

Hog is careful. Harold is not. Harold cannot help smiling. Hog can. Hog worries so that Harold does not have to.


Harold and Hog are best friends. But can Harold and Hog's friendship survive a game of pretending to be Elephant & Piggie?
