4. Superintendent's Report

4.01 Superintendent's Report for December 18, 2014

The holiday concerts in the Middle School and High School are growing in leaps and bounds. Dr. Brady received unsolicited emails from community members and graduates about their progress.

For the past two years, the District has been discussing the branding process and how to capture the essence of our strategic Vision and Mission. Dr. Brady shared a video depicting a sneak peek of the new "Pages of Progress" identity for the District.

The commissioner of the State Education Department has resigned to accept a position on President Obama's staff.

The LHCSS had their annual meeting with 22 legislators to discuss how they might influence policy decisions that support public education.

Discussion included:

- Gap Elimination Adjustment
- Restoration of foundation aid
- Common Core uncertainty
- Mandatory field testing
- Standardized test scores tied to teacher evaluation
- Issues around local versus SED negotiated teacher evaluation no movement currently underway to revamp

SED will be publishing graduation rates – their data is flawed and based on incomplete information from the College Clearinghouse.

- The State looks at number of graduates who are continuing on to higher education in two year or four year colleges.
- They contracted a Clearing House to collect data not all colleges participate.

7.01 School Data and Academic Progress

Mr. Berry, Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction, presented an overview of the elementary and middle school data and academic progress.

Highlights:

- Thanked the administrators for their work on the presentations and to the teachers for coming out tonight in support
- Data affords us multiple opportunities to look at the results in different ways
- We are aware of interventions required in sub groups
- Plans for scoring changes of the spring assessments 2015 will be shared after the presentations
- 13-14 data represents the 4th year of the 12 year Common Core phase-in and the 2nd year of common core assessments
- Our goal is to have the Class of 2022 pass the Regents at the Common Core college entry level
- 13-14 data represents 2nd common core assessments
- NYS identifies the sub group "economically disadvantaged" also as free and reduced lunch or poverty
 - o 92 students in grades 3-8 in 2013
 - o 107 students in 2014
 - o % scoring at Level 3 and 4 remained the same
- We can do better, and each District is unique
- We are in a cycle of continued improvement
- The buildings have wonderful steps in place to improve scores going forward; some will have immediate and some will have long term effects
- Dobbs Ferry chose the harder path to look at sub groups for intervention

- What are we doing now (Math)

Highlights:

- Students are doing better in Math than ELA
- In the past, if a child was reading at or above grade level generally they did well on the test
 Not the case anymore 80 students reading at grade level; but only 50% passed the ELA
- Reading level is determined by different methods (K-2 DRA 3-5 Teacher College Assessment)
- Books that were read in the 8th grade are now being read in 6th grade
- In the past, the tests had fewer questions and less testing time
- AIS support is being increased
- WIN periods help deliver more targeted instruction
- Increase staff awareness of which students need to increase reading levels
- 74 students in 2012-13 needed AIS; in 2014-15 we have 216 students

- Unable to help beyond the mandate
- Springhurst is requesting an additional AIS position
- Opting out of testing hurts the District
- What are other Districts reading results? Districts haven't shared that data.
- It is difficult to pin point one particular student's progress, but at building levels we are tracking progress performance in AIS programs
- Springhurst is working on redesigning the report cards to be aligned with the Common Core

- Level two's can still be on track for HS graduation
- Scale scores are a better way to track students' progress
- Math scores are good
- We are concentrating on ELA
- Changed AIS Model
- AIS 55 students in ELA 49 students in Math
- Fully servicing all mandated students
- Scales scores are not on the reports anymore
- iReady AIS online diagnostic program
- Benchmark assessments
- ELA after school academy twice a week
- Saturday academy for ELA and test taking skills
- All teachers are ELA teachers
- Standard based rubrics
