Native American Heritage Month Resources

Indigenous peoples are often overlooked by the dominant forces in contemporary American society. They're a vital part of our past, but also of our present and future. While this resource list focuses on the Indigenous peoples of the United States, it also contains a section acknowledging native peoples of other countries in the Americas. These stories span contemporary life as well as historical fact and are part of a growing movement in publishing to better represent marginalized voices. Many are about Native Americans of the continental United States, but Native Hawaiians and Alaskans appear too.
